## The First Commandment with Promise

Children are instructed by God to obey their parents in the Lord, for this is right. The commandment is the fourth of *The Ten Commandments*, and the first with promise. The Apostle Paul states it this way: *Honour thy father and thy mother, that it may be well with thee and that thou mayest live long on the earth* (Ephesians 6:2-3). You find the commandment introduced in Exodus 20:12 and repeated in Deuteronomy 5:16.

To acknowledge the commandment is to identify gender: everyone has a father and a mother. Obeying this commandment is to demonstrate a humble attitude: to actually *honour* thy father and thy mother. By it we recognize God's order for the family: the father first, the mother second, the children third. To practice this commandment is to grasp equality: honour is shown to both our father and our mother. Indeed, this is the first act of obedience men perform toward God's Word from childhood.

This is the first of the six commandments that define man's dealings with men. The six literally encompass how we are to love our neighbor, beginning with the first people with whom we interact: our parents. Learning to honour one's father and to honour one's mother sets the tone for how we respond toward all authority figures.

Honour is not something we can demand. Honour is freely given to someone we admire. Our admiration is based on the character of its recipient. A loving father is not only the protector and the provider, but also the proper pattern for his children. They learn how they should live day by day by his example. His honoring of their mother helps the children emulate his practice. Likewise, as their mother honors their father, the children will naturally follow by honoring him themselves.

God's commandment to honour thy father and thy mother places a requirement on the parents to be honorable in their own conduct. A parent who curses his children or beats his wife or brow-beats the family cannot demand honour. He does not deserve honour. Yet, honouring him in spite of himself may be the one way an older child may reach his hard heart for Christ.

We cannot undo the past; we can do right today. We are to honor our father and our mother, regardless of their worthiness; and, God will give a reward for doing so.

## A Mother's Work is Never Done

With each successive generation, a Mother's work is never done!

#### Is Gratitude a Lost Grace?

The Oxford Dictionary defines *gratitude* as "the quality of being thankful; readiness to show appreciation for and to return kindness." The term *gratitude* is not used in Scripture; yet, we find its synonym, *thanks*, abounding in the Word of God.

The first use of *thanks* is in a song of David, recorded in 2 Samuel 22. Verse 50 reads – *Therefore I will give thanks unto thee, O Lord, among the heathen, and I will sing praises unto thy name.* Why did David show the Lord thanks? Because God delivered him from all his enemies (v. 1).

The Lord recompensed David according to his righteousness; according to his cleanness in the sight of the Lord. With the merciful, God will show himself merciful. With the upright, God will show himself upright. With the pure, God will show himself pure (verses 25-27).

Reflecting God's righteousness begins with receiving the mercy of God in Christ Jesus. As the publican humbled himself, saying, *God*, *be merciful to me*, *a sinner* (Luke 18:13), so must we acknowledge our need for God's mercy.
