REJOICE THAT YOUR NAME IS WRITTEN IN HEAVEN

Ever wonder why some things are stated in the Bible? Our Lord is instructing the seventy disciples sent out in pairs to preach the gospel of the kingdom of God (Luke 10:1). He had previously sent out the twelve (Luke 9:1). The seventy have returned, with joy, saying, *Lord, even the devils are subject unto us through thy name* (Luke 10:17). The Lord's lesson: *Notwithstanding, in this rejoice not, that the spirits are subject unto you; but rather rejoice, because your names are written in heaven* (Luke 10:20).

What the twelve were able to do in the opening verses of Luke 9 (vv. 1-7), they were unable to do over eight days later (v. 28): they could not deliver a man's son from an unclean spirit (Luke 9:37-40). Our abilities change with time and circumstance. What we could do in our twenties will not be possible after a few decades pass. If our rejoicing is based on our successes, we will be riding a roller-coaster, emotionally.

Learning to rejoice in that which cannot change (our salvation: that our names are written in heaven) gives us a stability over the ups and downs of life. The only question that then remains is this: *How does one have his name written in heaven?*

Faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. When men hate you and separate from you and reproach you and cast out your name as evil, for the Son of man's sake, you can rejoice: for great is your reward in heaven (Luke 6:22-23). When men shall revile you and persecute you and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for Christ's sake, rejoice. Be exceeding glad: for great is your reward in heaven (Matthew 5:11-12).

The Lord himself said, *Whosoever believeth in him* (the Son of man) *should not perish but have eternal life* (John 3:15). *I am come a light into the world, that whosoever believeth on me should not abide in darkness* (John 12:46). The Apostle John adds, *Whosoever believeth that Jesus is the Christ is born of God* (1 John 5:1).
